

Help Protect Our Water System!

Please help Erie Water Works and your community keep the water system safe by looking out for unauthorized fire hydrant use. Fire hydrants should only be used by firefighters and other emergency personnel, water works employees, and those who have applied for and obtained a permit in advance. Please call 814-870-8000 between 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. in order to obtain a fire hydrant use application and permit. Proper use of a hydrant for nonemergency purposes includes the installation of a meter and backflow preventer, which ensures that the water system is protected and that the cost of the water is accounted for. Unprotected use of the hydrant may lead to a potential cross-connection that could result in drinking water becoming contaminated and unsafe. Pictured below is a fire hydrant with the necessary meter and backflow preventer. Improper, unauthorized, or unpermitted use of a fire hydrant will result in fines and legal action.

LEAD TALK

The Erie Water Works has maintained full compliance with the Environmental Protection Agency's Lead and Copper Rule, passed in 1991. Prior to 2011 when Congress passed the Reduction of Lead in Drinking Water Act, plumbing products like pipe, fittings and fixtures such as faucets were permitted to contain up to 8% lead. Because lead is likely present in some form within the plumbing systems of our customers, we successfully manage lead by providing optimized corrosion control treatment to prevent it from leaching from plumbing components into the water.

Since 2004, Erie Water Works crews have replaced over 5,800 lead gooseneck service connections, averaging 290 per year. This critical work represents an investment of \$18 million (M) in the past 20 years. Between 2022 and 2027, an additional \$49M will be invested to remove all 7,500 remaining lead goosenecks from the public water system. The majority of the funding was provided by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, which includes \$40M in grants and \$9M in low interest loans. The Erie Water Works has received more funding to eradicate lead pipe than every City in Pennsylvania other than Pittsburgh. Our resolve to "Get the Lead Out" has never been so strong.
